# BONSAI Design

# Bonsai as Art

isual art in any form seeks to convey a mood or feeling to the viewer. The artist imparts this power in his or her creation in various ways. This power in constant. The creation is constant – a moment captured and held by time. Depending on the medium and style

the artist employs, the creation may be defined by any of three dimensions: height, width and/or depth.

Bonsai however, is a unique form of visual art due to the element of change. Like any other visual art, bonsai seeks to convey mood and feeling, but this power to convey mood and feeling is not constant because the creation is not constant. A bonsai is not captured or held by time, but rather punctuates moments in time whenever it is viewed.

A bonsai is not constant. It changes with the seasons and with the years. indeed, the mood that is conveyed intensifies with time as the creation itself ages and grows. Herein lied the uniqueness and power of bonsai, for while it is defined by the three dimensions of height, width and depth, it is the bonsai itself that defines a fourth dimension... time.

A bonsai defines time by the gradual spread of its roots, the texture of its bark that age produces, the taper of the trunk, the ramification of branches and twigs, the angles and



movement of its branches and its overall proportion and shape which evolve over the years.

It is our experience which helps us to define these parameters in the bonsai we create. And indeed, this is one of the goals of our art – to return us to some experience, some memory; a woodland forest, a lone tree in a meadow, or an isolated tree on some distant mountain peak.


When one strives to become a visual artist, one studies all the mechanics of that art and the various methods of its application. In oil painting for example, one studies the rudiments of design, how objects are created in perspective, how balance is achieved and how to use positive and negative space. One learns the various styles of painting and practices their application, such as impressionism, realism and cubism. The oil painter learns to use a variety of tools, such as various types of brushes, palette knives, mediums, glazes and canvas preparations. One learns about color and how analogous and complimentary hues are used to create certain effects and moods and how best to utilize tones, tints and shades.

One learns the mechanics, methods of application and how to apply these principles so that one may then develop a style that is uniquely one's own. Becoming an artist in any visual art is a process of growth and once the artist has developed his or her skill, the rules and forms are then molded to form the art that is unique to that artist.

It is the same with bonsai. We study the mechanics of working with trees and various methods of applying horticultural techniques. We study basic design and how perspective is achieved with trunk movement and branch placement. We learn about visual balance and the use of positive and negative space. We learn the many styles of bonsai and practice their application in a variety of formats and design. We learn how to use the many tools available to us and become proficient in their use. We learn about color and texture and the effects of style and container upon mood. And we learn how to express time through the structure of our creations.

We learn so that we may grow; so that we may become artists with a style uniquely our own and more importantly, with creations uniquely or own. A part of that learning process is being molded by the rules and structure of bonsai. But we need to be careful that the rules and structure, the mechanics and principles do not become our end, but are simply the means for us to begin. We need to be careful that we do not conform our creativity and expressions to the rules of bonsai and models that define specific styles, lest all of our creations look the same. If we are to become artists of a living medium with nature as our guide and inspiration, we must remember that living things are not rigid and we have but to look around us to see that nature creates magnificent beauty and works of art in trees that often break the "rules".

Lastly, we must be careful not to simply be imitators of nature, for there is little art in recreating what has already been created.


# BONSAI Books

There are many beginning bonsai books around - most with adequate information on bonsai history, basics of style, wiring care etc. Many of us have multiple versions. Occasionally though you run across books on specific subjects or a different take on existing information. Depending on your needs, these may prove useful to you. I've recently been reading two books which may be of interest.

Bonsai Heresy by Michael Hagedorn (Available through Stone Lantern Bonsai and Superfly Bonsai) \$24.95

If you are looking for a book full of pictures this isn't it. It is purely information. Michael Hagedorn, a bonsai professional who studied with Boon Manakitivipart and with Shinji Suzuki in Japan, was raised in a scientific household by an entomologist father. The book's approach is to look at common bonsai myths from a scientific perspective - both through actual scientific research where available and evaluation of long standing



traditions and observations. Practices in the nursery industry are also evaluated for what can or cannot apply to bonsai.

I have finished reading this book and have highlighted enough relevant information that I now need to go back through my highlights - reread and make notes. A few highlights:

- When you buy raw plants at nurseries, the tags usually have the hardiness zones. Those stats, however, are for top hardiness of plants in the ground - not plants in containers. The book has a chart of both root hardiness and top hardiness for various plants in containers.
- A section on what growth enhancers have been found to work or not work.
- Sections on growing media, growth and development, repotting, watering, fertilization
- A section on wiring different species
- A section on aesthetics


You may or may not agree with everything in this book, (I'm sure some things in Aesthetics, Fertilizers or Soil will set off

arguments), but it is written from a unique perspective and well written. I would recommend it.

### Practical Guide to Bonsai Styles of the World by Charles S. Ceronio (Available on Amazon) \$26.21

I am currently reading this book but have been through enough to recommend it. Charles Ceronio studied under John Naka. He is based in South Africa and has developed a number of African bonsai styles.

This book is chock full of illustration and pictures. There are small but very useful sections in the beginning about Bonsai Composition and Design and Basic Art Concepts Applicable to Bonsai.



The rest of the book is a guide to more than 40 bonsai styles. All the styles are clearly illustrated with guidance on what those styles entail as well as what should or shouldn't be done to achieve those styles.

- An example of this would be the Twin Trunk style. Advice is given on the proportion of the width and heights of the two trunks, harmony and trunk movement of the two trees, positioning in the pot and branch arrangement. In addition 12 different examples are shown of variations on that style (slanting, literati etc) along with descriptions and advice pertaining to those sub-styles.

If you are looking for help in learning how to style your bonsai - or if you are looking to expand your horizons to different or more unusual styles, I would recommend this book.
